Bodies that Could Kill

Female Sexuality
in 21st Century
Anti-Japanese
War Films of China

This talk will discuss female sexuality as a trope and spectacle—both thoughtfully deployed and crudely exploited—in Chinese films about the Anti-Japanese War (1937–1945). The recent prominence of female sexuality on the big and small screens, from feminine charm to nudity and sexual violence, is symptomatic of two tendencies in the representation of the war. On the one hand, female sexuality as a trope opens up new possibilities for critical examination of the complexity of the war in ways that have not been possible before. On the other, sexuality as spectacle allows war dramas to use the eroticized female body to titillate the audience, a development most evident on TV but not restricted to it.

As a conclusion, it will be argued that the current absence of a positively enforced official representation of the war combined with the powerful pull of commercialism and the constraints imposed by continuing political taboos have resulted in a polarized prominence of the female body. This has become a site for exploring the complexity and contradictions of the war. At the same time, more frequently, it has been paraded as voyeuristic spectacle under the pretext of purveying patriotic lessons. While the nationalist discourse during the Anti-Japanese War had monopolized it and denied its femininity, the market has now taken over the female body and demands extreme displays of sexuality.

Timothy Yun Hui TSU is a professor at the School of International Studies, Kwansei Gakuin University. Educated in Japanese and American universities, he has worked in Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore, and Australia before returning to teach in Japan. His academic interests include the Chinese in Japan, the Japanese in colonial Southeast Asia, Chinese food in Japan, Japan environmental and consumer culture, and world heritage in East Asia. His most recent publications are *Japanese and Chinese Films on the Second World War* (co-editor, Routledge, 2014) and *World Heritage in China, Japan, Taiwan, and Hong Kong* (co-editor, Chung Hwa, 2014, in Chinese). He is co-organizer of the following upcoming international conferences: "Fighting Women in Chinese Pop-Culture" (with Hong Kong Polytechnic University), "Masculinity and War" (with the Institute for War, Genocide, and Holocaust Studies, the Netherlands), and "Heritage and Hybridity in Contemporary East Asian Foodways" (with Hong Kong Shue Yan University).
