Colonial ports in modern Asia, including the socalled treaty ports, unquestionably worked as the bridgeheads of colonial rule to infringe upon the authority, sovereignty, and economic selfreliance of the existing regional polities. Some recent historical works, however, have been energetically illuminating and emphasizing transformation, and cultural socio-economic innovations that utilized new infrastructure and order/networks of commerce, intra-regional finance, migration, and information provided by the colonial ports.

The workshop will as a whole discuss two ke questions below so as to explore "complexity of innovative colonial milieu":

- · To what an extent did socio-economic/ cultural transformations in these port cities and their hinterland provide the spaces for the creations of openness and public order?
- · What sort of constraints and regulations of colonialism persisted within the economic/cultural transformations?

The focus is to include Shanghai, Taipei, Kobe, Incheon, Singapore, Bombay in regard to ports, and banking, architectures, clothes, fashion goods, medicines, sanitation, for topics.
